# CITY COUNCIL ACTION ROUNDUP

# **November 26 City Council Meeting**

- Delivered Proclamation honoring Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day.
- Authorized City Manager to change from Cal Card to Umpqua Bank Card for City business.

- Accepted completion of FY 2022-23 Pavement Project Improvements and FY 2023-24 Annual Sidewalk Maintenance Project Improvements.
- Introduced first reading of Ordinance 760-2024 Retail Cannabis Dispensary Business in Central Commercial zoning, and Ordinance 761-2024 Retail Cannabis Dispensary Business in General Commercial and Light Industrial Zones.
- Adopted a resolution to modify distance requirements for Cannabis retail dispensary businesses.

#### **December 10 City Council Meeting**

- Confirmed 2024 November Election Certification.
- Approved \$5,000 to join Glenn County and City of Orland and participate in an energy assessment with Pioneer Energy, Community Choice Aggregator to determine whether the City of Willows should participate in community choice aggregation to procure energy at lower rates than currently provided by PG&E.
- Approved Resolutions and Agreements with the State of California to implement the 1.5% Transactions and Use Tax that was approved on the November 2024 ballot.
- Approved sewage pump repairs in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 and to be paid from the City's Enterprise Sewage Fund.
- Approved amending the City's Fire Recovery USA agreement to include a CPI escalator.
- Approved WM's Consumer Price Index rate increase of 1.9% for garbage collection.

#### **December 17 Special City Council Meeting**

- Authorized the City Manager to execute a contract amendment for time only with Prentice Long to update the Willows Municipal Code by September 30, 2025.
- Elected Vice-Mayor Evan Hutson to be the City's next Mayor and Councilmember Rick Thomas to be the Vice-Mayor.
- Appointed Councilmembers to 2025 Council Committees.
- Approved Council 2025 Meeting Calendar and Schedule.



# City Hall ADA Door and Parking Upgrades

This project consists of upgrading three exterior doorways located at Willows City Hall and Library with new ADA compliant doors, hardware, power-assisted door operators



and accessible push buttons, openings, frames, and related storefront components, and electrical improvements. There will also be pavement rehabilitation in the parking lot to make ADA parking stall surfaces compliant including pathways to front entrances. New signage, markings and striping will be installed in ADA parking stalls. This project is grant funded in its entirety and will assist the mobility impaired in accessing city services.



# **Leaf Pickup Delay**

While Leaf pickup began in early
November, as many residents noticed,
there have been considerable delays.
The City's Leaf Vacuum Truck was out of
commission for more than a month due
to a failed clutch. The truck was repaired
and came back online the week of
December 9. While it was out of service,
staff resorted to picking up leaf piles



using a backhoe and dump truck, which is a much slower process. At times, even the Fire Department helped out in an effort to avoid flooding during some of the areas heavier rains this past

month. City staff appreciates the community's patience with the delays in leaf pile pickup. Now that the Leaf Vacuum Truck has been repaired, the City is back up to full speed and all piles should be removed by January.

**Reminder:** Please only rake leaves into piles for collection (e.g., no branches, no twigs). Piles should be located 2-3 feet away from gutters (in the street) so that they do not prevent storm water drainage.

**Fats, Oils, Grease (FOG) Awareness** Keep Fats, Oils and Grease out of the Sink! EPA's Report to Congress on combined sewer overflows and sanitary sewer overflows identified that "grease from restaurants, homes, and industrial sources are the most common cause (47%) of reported blockages. Grease is problematic because it solidifies, reduces conveyance capacity, and blocks flow." 
#### Youth Basketball is back!



#### **Business Licenses**

While HdL (the City's third-party business license vendor) overlooked implementing the City's newly updated Master Fee Schedule and experienced other difficulties with the renewal process, the City is pleased to announced that its that much closer to implementing the new Tyler Technologies software and bringing business license processing back inhouse. Staff anticipates the transition will be complete by the end of the first quarter in 2025 (e.g., end of March).

# **Emergency Upstaffing & Strike Team**

On November 4-6, Willows Fire Department (WFD) upstaffed a strike team for a red flag wind event. WFD staff also participated in a county wide Preposition with one engine and a strike team leader along with other Glenn County Fire Departments. All costs associated with the upstaffing was funded by the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES).

On November 19-25, WFD upstaffed a strike team for the storm surge response with one engine and a strike team leader in a County wide Preposition effort. Units from Bayliss and Artois, also on Preposition, assisted WFD and Willows Public Works with sand bagging, leaf pick up and clearing clogged storm drains. All costs associated with this upstaffing was funded by CAL OES.





#### **Emergency Response Highlights**


On November 10, WFD responded to a mutual aid vegetation fire in Orland, along with other Glenn County units with one engine and one water tender. The fire was extinguished after about two acres had burned and no structures were damaged. The cause of the fire was determined to be arson.


On November 16, WFD was dispatched to a residential structure fire on Donnie Lane. Later joined by automatic aid from Orland and Artois Fire, the initial WFD engine company arrived within 4 minutes of dispatch, to a residential structure with smoke showing. Units discovered a small fire in the garage from a cooking appliance. The fire was extinguished and contained to the garage. The cause of the fire was determined to be unintential as a result of cooking. No injuries were reported.

#### **Training**

On November 5, WFD Conducted a large scale multi company mega drill at the Willows High School. Units practiced arrival drills, scene size up, incident command structure, ventilation tactics, hose deployment, water supply, mayday procedures, search and rescue and rapid intervention team deployments.

On November 12, WFD conducted training in hose deployment techniques for new members of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Special reading activities in December will include book and character giveaways and incentives to keep kids reading and learning throughout the holiday vacations in December and January.


