City Clerk Update



Engineering Division

Update: Waste Water Treatment Plant Solar Array Project

The City has been working for some time to install a supplemental solar array to offset its 24/7 electrical use at the Waste Water Treatment Plant. Barrier Solar, the City's contractor building the solar array project, recent executed an Electric Extension Agreement with PG&E in the amount of \$34,500. This Agreement and payment will facilitate PG&E infrastructure improvements needed to complete the installation and operation of the solar array. Barrier Solar has completed approximately 80% of the construction drawings needed to build the project. Staff anticipates the project will be built and operational by the end of the 2025 calendar year.



Jensen Park Pathway Improvement Project
On February 18, 2025, the City will issue a
Notice to Proceed to complete construction of
this project by April 14, 2025. The work will
include resurfacing the Americans with
Disabilities Act (ADA) parking surface area at
the public restroom on Elm Street, and
installation of walking paths connecting the
ADA parking space to the playgrounds, gazebo
and seating areas. This project was funded
through a Housing and Community
Development Services grant.



Appointments to the Planning Commission are made by the Mayor with the approval of the City Council.

- 4. **PASSED** Tacos Ocampos, 361 West Sycamore Street: Amendment of previously approved Design Review application to include a storage shed as an accessory structure to the business.


Application to amend a Conditional Use and Design Review permit to construct a multifamily triplex on the premises of motel converted to residential units. Elevation drawings are shown below.



Retail Cannabis Businesses

Recent ordinance changes expanded allowable zones for Cannabis businesses to include Central Commercial, General Commercial, and Light Industrial zones, in addition to the existing Highway Commercial and Mixed-Use zones. The City is now accepting applications for the two permitted Cannabis retail businesses in the city limits.

Application packages to apply for one of the two licenses are currently available on the City's website. Phase 1 applications are due during the application acceptance window of March 3 - March 7, 2025. Should initial applicants successfully complete the Phase 1 application process, they will be invited to apply for Phase 2 of the process.



The City's goal is to support dispensaries

that seamlessly blend into the community, foster trust, support local initiatives, and create welcoming spaces for all. By focusing on responsible practices, community engagement, and thoughtful design, the City will ensure cannabis businesses not only meet regulatory standards but also become valued members of the Willows community.

New Disk Golf Pads Installed in 20/30 Park!

In partnership with the Willows Rotary Club, the City's Public Works division installed cement disc golf pads at the 20/30 park. City staff dug out the golf pads and prepared the framing. Rotary poured the concrete and applied the insignias. These pads replaced rubber mats that were worn and uneven providing a more stable launch area.

Drainage Pipe Failure

Staff inspected a storm drain on Donnie Lane and found that the drainage pipe had collapsed causing water to backup and erode the dirt in the vicinity. The area was excavated, a new section of drainage pipe was installed, and material was backfilled and compacted. The collapse was as a result of the heavy rain received in early February, which mitigated flooding and the risk of property damage to the surrounding area.

Storm Drain Flood Mitigation Tips

Public Works employees perform preventative maintenance on storm drains throughout the year and ahead of major storm events; however, the city always appreciates assistance from residents to minimize drainage issues and flooding. To that end, ensuring clean storm drains absent of any obstructions is a simple but effective way homeowners can mitigate flood risks in their neighborhood. For example:

- 1. **Regularly Remove Debris** Clear leaves, trash, and other debris from storm drains and gutters to ensure proper water flow.
- 2. **Avoid Dumping Yard Waste** Grass clippings, branches, and other yard waste can clog drains; instead, dispose of them properly or use composting.
- 3. **Check Drains Before Storms** Before heavy rain, inspect nearby storm drains and remove any blockages.
- 4. **Encourage Neighbors to Help** A community effort to keep drains clear will significantly reduce local flood risk.
- 5. **Report Blocked Drains to Public Works** If a storm drain is clogged, immediately notify the local public works department.

Willows Municipal Code Fun Fact: <u>Title 10- Vehicles and Traffic</u>

Chapter 20.20- Pedestrians

10.20.050 Obstructing free passage of pedestrians on sidewalk or crosswalk – Annoying pedestrians.

No person shall stop, stand or sit in or upon any sidewalk area or crosswalk nor place or permit to be placed any physical object in any manner so as to hinder or obstruct the free passage of pedestrians thereon, nor shall any person annoy or molest such pedestrians. [Code 1959 § 11.59; prior code § 16-82].





Finance and Measure I Oversight Committee Meeting


The inaugural meeting of the Finance and Measure I Oversight Committee (FMiOC) occurred on Tuesday, January 21, 2025.

At the meeting, City Manager Brown and Finance Director Moore presented an overview and status update of the city's finances to Finance Committee Members Vice-Mayor Thomas and Councilmember Busby.

During the meeting, the Committee also requested additional information on the following topics:

Willows Rural Fire Protection District Update

The Willows Rural Fire Protection District is moving forward with a Proposition 218

assessment to increase funding to the Special District.

Ballots will be mailed to District members on February 20, 2025. The increased assessment will only affect residents in the Willows Rural Fire Protection District. IT WILL NOT AFFECT ANY PARCELS IN THE CITY OF WILLOWS.



The Willows Rural Fire Protection District is a separate legal entity from the City of Willows.

The Willows Rural Fire Protection District is funded by a small portion of property taxes (~\$64K annually) and a voter approved "special assessment" (~\$34K). The special assessment has not been increased since it was originally adopted in 1992. The passage of the Proposition 218 will allow the Willows Rural Fire Protection District to adequately plan and fund for the future of fire protection and emergency services within the Willows Rural Fire Protection District.

While the Rural District and the City are separate legal entities, they have been sharing resources and response capabilities since 1975, as well as work seamlessly together everyday to protect and serve the greater Willows community.

Willows Fire Department deployed to Palisades Fire

WFD sent two strike team leaders and one engine to the Palisades Fire in the City of Los Angeles. Units were deployed for 10 days and had various assignments including fire attack, structure defense, mop up, evacuations, and more. In total, Glenn County sent three engines and two Strike team leaders. These deployments were funded by the California Office of Emergency Services.






Grant Management Update

- Cal Fire Foundation Grant (\$15K) Close out documents were finalized and submitted to Cal Fire.
- Cal Fire Weed Abatement Grant (\$80K) Documentation was submitted to amend the Weed Abatement Grant as the Fire Department is unable to use the grant funds in their entirety for the originally approved scope of work. Consequently, staff requested \$80k to purchase a stump grinder attachment for the backhoe, a claw attachment for the backhoe and a commercial chipper (all equipment that is also used by and needed for the Public Works Division). Fortunately, the amendment was supported by the local Cal Fire jurisdiction. As a result, the amendment is moving forward to the State. There is a high probability that the amended letter and proposed purchases will receive final approval.
- Rural Fire Capacity (RFC) Grant (\$9K) During RFC grant close out review, it was pleasantly discovered that the department has approximately \$9000 remaining for additional communications equipment purchases (e.g., portable radios). As a result, staff is working to procure new radios allowing the FD to pass some of its older yet still functioning radios to Public Works for continued use.
- Vehicle AbatementStaff prepared back up documentation and invoicing

for Q4-2024 abatement tows that have occurred. Documentation was submitted to Glenn County for reimbursement from the Vehicle Abatement Fund. Staff continues to work with the GCSO and City of Orland to fully resurrect the Vehicle Abatement Program.





LIBRARY

Temporary Closure of the Willows LibraryThe Willows Library was closed from

February 6 to February 10 due to partial ceiling collapse in the back portion of the library. Since then, the ceiling has been reinforced and the area is being closely monitored until permanent repairs can be made.

After a structural engineer's assessment was completed, the library was cleared to reopen on Tuesday, February 11. Staff continues to make steady progress to permanently repair the ceiling and possibly the roof (e.g., work with insurance adjuster, contractors). Library staff will continue to



update the community as progress is made and the situation is resolved.

Even when the building is closed, don't forget that the library has many digital resources at the community's disposal, including:


- The Libby app and NorthNet Library System to access eBooks & eAudio;




