City of Willows Seeks a Part-Time Interim City Librarian and Two Part-Time Library Clerks

As many are aware, the City's long time contract Library Director, Jody Meza is leaving the City of Willows effective June 30. Moving forward, she will be the full time Library Director for the Orland Free Library and the Glenn County library branches.

As a result of her departure, the City of Willows has an immediate need and opening for a part-time Interim City Librarian while the City recruits for a new permanent City Librarian. In addition, two of the library's part-time Clerks have also tendered their resignations, so the City is recruiting for those positions as well.



(4) No person shall grow cannabis in the city of Willows until and unless they first secure a




(5) It is hereby declared to be unlawful, a public nuisance and a violation of this article for any person owning, leasing, occupying, or having charge or possession of any parcel within the city to cause or allow such parcel to be used for the cultivation of marijuana, unless the person is authorized by state law to grow marijuana for a specifically authorized purpose within a private residence in a residential zone, and such authorized grower is complying with all requirements of this chapter. Sewer Lift Station Rehabilitation Project

This project will provide much needed upgrades to the five sewer lift/pump stations and will upgrade them to a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system - used in industrial settings to monitor and control processes across geographically dispersed locations. The new SCADA system will allow the lift stations to be monitored remotely and provide more accurate data for volumetric flows. Staff anticipate receiving all the equipment for the project by the end of June. Construction is planned to begin in July and will provide updates on construction locations when they become available.

Retail Cannabis License Conditional Use Permit

The City of Willows invites the public to attend a public hearing on Tuesday, July 1, 2025, at 6:00 p.m., or shortly thereafter, in the Council Chambers of the Civic Center (201 N. Lassen Street, Willows) to review and consider two Conditional Use Permit applications for cannabis retail dispensaries:

- CUP 25-01 An application for approval of a Conditional Use Permit for a 1,824 sq. ft. cannabis dispensary at 157 North Butte Street (APN: 002-162-006).
- CUP 25-02 An application for approval of a Conditional Use Permit for a 1,803 sq. ft. cannabis dispensary at 130 North Butte Street, Suite A & B (APN: 003-044-005).

Black Bear Diner EV Charging Station Design Review (DR 25-04)

A new electric vehicle (EV) charging station is planned at 246 North Humboldt Avenue. The site will feature five Level 3 DC fast chargers with overhead canopies, and provide reliable, high-speed charging compatible with all EV models



Planning Commission Vacancy - Update

The application period to fill one vacant seat on the City of Willows Planning Commission has closed. Two applications were received by the June 18, 2025, 2:00 p.m. deadline.

Interviews were held the same day, and the City Council Ad-Hoc Committee has selected a candidate to recommend for appointment. The recommendation is scheduled for consideration at the June 24, 2025, City Council meeting. If approved, the new Commissioner will serve the remainder of the term, from July 2025 through December 31, 2027.

The City extends its appreciation to all who expressed interest in serving the Willows community.

Jack in the Box

The City of Willows approved the Civil and Building plans for the jack in the Box project. The applicant submitted plans to Caltrans to approve construction in the Highway 162 right-of-way. The project is located on the vacant parcel on the southside of



Highway 162/Wood Street to the east of the existing Chevron gas station.

Free Summer Swim Program at Willows High School


The City of Willows will use the Willows High School swimming pool for the 2025 summer season again while rehabilitation work continues on the City-owned pool in Sycamore Park.

it will be reserved for swim lessons sponsored by the Willows Unified School District. Review and print the <u>June Schedule</u>.



FIREFire Response, Prevention & Emergency Medical Services

Fire Season is here!

The 2025 Fire season started in May with the year's first red flag warning. Please be mindful of changing weather conditions and ensure that mowing and weeding is completed early in the morning to lessen the risk of accidentally starting a fire.

Major Local Incidents

Infant Delivery - A Local Life-Saving Effort Comes Full Circle

On March 7, 2025, the Willows Fire Department responded within minutes to a medical emergency on South Culver Street, where a woman was in active labor, two months early. Firefighters quickly began emergency care, and upon the arrival of Enloe Paramedics, the patient was transported under Code 3 to Glenn Medical Center, where the mother safely delivered Baby Colton.

Earlier in June, Captain Kyle Enos reunited with Baby Colton and his mother at the Willows Fire Station, celebrating a outcome made possible through rapid response, teamwork, and access to local emergency care.

"This is why we do what we do," said Fire Chief Nathan Monck, highlighting the importance of Glenn Medical Center and strong local partnerships in life-saving outcomes. For more information, view the <u>Press Release</u>.



Truck Roll Over

On May 26, WFD responded to a reported roll over on I-5 just north of County Road 48. Willows Engine Companies arrived to find a pick up truck on its roof with major damage with an enclosed utility trailer that had come to rest on top. All occupants were able to self extricate, one patient was transported to the hospital for evaluation.



Vegetation Fire

On May 8, WFD responded to a reported vegetation fire at the Willows Airport. Engines arrived on scene to find approximately one acre burning at a slow rate of spread. Units extinguished the fire and determined that the fire was accidently caused by agricultural equipment.

Controlled Burns

On May 15, WFD conducted a controlled burn near the city sewer plant.

Dumpster at "The Bamboo"

Working with Amber Bill of the County's Health & Human Services Agency, a County funded dumpster was dropped off near the "the bamboo." The transient population assisted with the cleanup effort by stacking the garbage and debris in a readily accessible area. When the dumpster arrived, the Public Works crew loaded it with a backhoe to ensure random dumpers did not fill the dumpster before the intended transient trash had filled it. While significant progress was made, It's still far from cleaned up.

Vehicle Abatement at 321 North Sacramento Street (Alley)

After receiving several complaints and inaction by the registered owner, the sedan was towed under 22651(K) of the CVC. Other than staff time, there was no cost to the City for this tow. The vehicle was initially tagged on April 16 and then tagged again on May 15. It was finally towed on May 19.

Weed Abatement Update

The Weed Abatement final survey has been completed and the City Contractor will begin abating parcels in the month of June.



It is imperative that all buildings in the City of Willows maintain a defensible space free of any fuels, organic or not, that could make a potentially bad situation worse. Light and flashy fuels such as seasonal weeds make it much easier for fires to jump from structure to structure, especially when hot and dry north winds that are so common this time of year come through the region.

Please do your part to keep the city safe and take care of any fire threats and dangers on and/or around your property!

Emergency Abatement at Nuisance Property

The City of Willows completed an emergency summary abatement at 143 North Yolo Street, a long-standing nuisance property that posed serious health, safety, and financial risks to the community. The action was authorized under Willows Municipal Code Section 8.10.160, following a fire on April 22, 2025, that severely damaged the abandoned 12-unit apartment complex.

The total cost of the abatement was \$41,251.23, which has been billed to the property owner. Should the abatement remain unpaid, the City will place a lien on the property.

City and Fire Department officials emphasized that this action follows years of failed compliance efforts and ongoing safety concerns. The emergency abatement reflects the City's commitment to protecting public welfare and holding negligent property owners accountable. For information, review the Press Release.

Trainings & Testing

Forcible Entry Door

On May 6, the Willows Fire Department received a new **Forcible Entry Door**—a specialized training prop that allows firefighters to safely practice techniques for breaking through locked or obstructed doors during emergencies.

During the evening's training, crews had the opportunity to train hands-on with the

new equipment, improving their skills and readiness for real-life situations where rapid access may save lives.

Purpose of a Forcible Entry Door:

- 1. Training for Realistic Scenarios It simulates residential, commercial, or industrial doors that firefighters might encounter during structure fires, rescues, or law enforcement assists.
- 2. Safe, Reusable Practice It allows repeated training with different resistance levels, materials, and locking mechanisms without damaging actual buildings.
- 3. Skill Development Firefighters use the prop to learn how to use tools like Halligans, axes, or hydraulic spreaders; practice inward and outward forcible entry; and understand door construction, locks, and frame types.
- 4. Team Coordination It helps crews develop communication, timing, and tactical coordination under stress—critical for safe and efficient operations.
- 5. Evaluating Tools and Techniques It allows instructors to demonstrate different forcible entry methods and evaluate what works best in different situations.

Stair Chair

On May 13, during drill night, crews trained on how to properly operate the new **Stair Chair.** This important piece of equipment is designed to safely, efficiently, and comfortably transport patients up or down stairs and through tight spaces, helping protect both patients and emergency responders during medical calls. This new tool enhances WFD's ability to respond effectively in challenging environments and continues the mission of delivering the highest standard of care and safety to our community.

The Stair Chair was purchased with funds raised through a recent raffle—thank you to everyone who contributed!

Hose & Ladder Testing

All Department Hose and Ladder Testing has been completed. Hose and ladder testing is a mandatory requirement under NFPA standards (specifically NFPA 1962 for fire hose and NFPA 1932 for ladders). These tests ensure that equipment is safe, reliable, and



ready for use in life-threatening situations. Fire hoses are pressure-tested annually to check for leaks, ruptures, or degradation, while ladders are inspected and load-tested for structural integrity and damage.

Regular testing is not just about compliance—it's about firefighter safety and operational readiness. A failed hose line or compromised ladder during an incident can lead to injury, delayed fire attack, or rescue failure. By adhering to testing standards,

departments protect their crews, ensure dependable equipment, and maintain public trust and safety.




Summer Reading Program

This is just the beginning! Join the Willows Library for more children's events all summer long as part of the library's "Level Up at Your Library" reading adventure.




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
