National Night Out is all about building relationships between neighbors and public safety partners, and this year's turnout showed just how strong and connected the Willows community truly is.

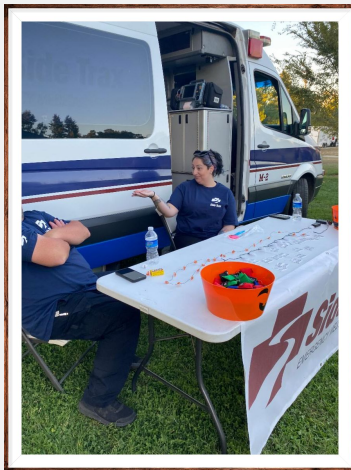

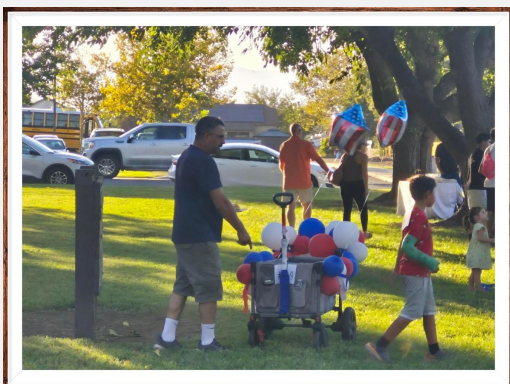

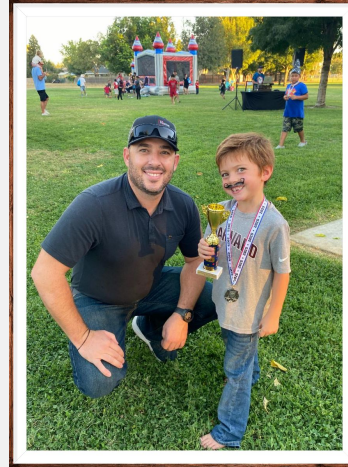

#### **Code Enforcement Division**

##### **Proactive Code Enforcement Efforts Yield Community Improvements**

Code Enforcement staff continued proactive outreach and enforcement efforts throughout the community this week. Notices were hand-delivered and sent via certified mail to property owners on multiple streets for various violations.

On Tehama Street, notices addressed unpermitted construction of a building and sewer work performed without proper permits.

On Plumas Street, property owners were cited for trash accumulation and operating a business without the required license or Conditional Use Permit.

On Edgewood Lane, violations included vehicles parked on lawns and sidewalks, an over-height fence, and overgrown vegetation obstructing a streetlight.

Additionally, a property on Crawford Avenue received notice for trash accumulation.

Several property owners have already taken corrective measures, including site



cleanups and obtaining the necessary permits. For those who fail to comply, staff will proceed with fines and abatement measures in accordance with the Willows Municipal Code.

## Engineering

### Sewage Main Replacement and Rehabilitation Project

The City of Willows has completed sewage main replacement work along Yolo Street between Oak and Sycamore Streets. Crews have also begun work on Sacramento Street, starting at the GCID canal and continuing to Sycamore Street. Locations for these upgrades were carefully selected based on detailed inspections using closed-circuit television (CCTV) footage of the underground pipes. This technology allowed the City to identify areas most in need of replacement, ensuring that repair efforts focus on the areas that will result in the greatest benefit.





### **Solar Project - Wastewater Treatment Plant**

With the rice harvest completed on the solar field site (adjacent to the WWTP), the solar contractor has ordered all steel supports, panels, and inverters and construction is expected to commence in November. Once installed, the system will significantly reduce energy costs at the wastewater treatment plant off setting the City's PG&E bill, and promote sustainable energy use.

## Planning Commission - October 7, 2025

### 1. Design Review of Wayfinding Signs **(APPROVED)**

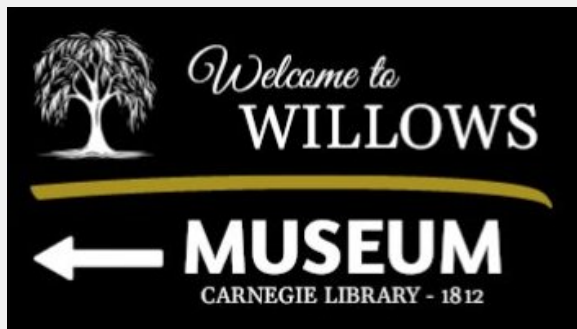
At this meeting, the design of the wayfinding signs was finalized. The City extends its appreciation to the Wayfinding Ad-Hoc Committee for their time and dedication in developing the new community wayfinding signs. Committee members include Vice Chair Corum, Commissioner Nygard, Councilmember Pride (Planning Commission Liaison), Downtown Business Owner Holly Myers, and Chamber of Commerce Office Manager Colleen Carter-Watkins. The new signs will be installed at key intersections, including Wood and Lassen Streets, Butte and Wood Streets, Lassen and Sycamore Streets, Tehama and Sycamore Streets, and at the Willows Museum. These signs will improve navigation, strengthen community identity, and support local businesses and tourism.

### 2. Lot Merger for 245 South Sonoma Residential Lots **(APPROVED)**

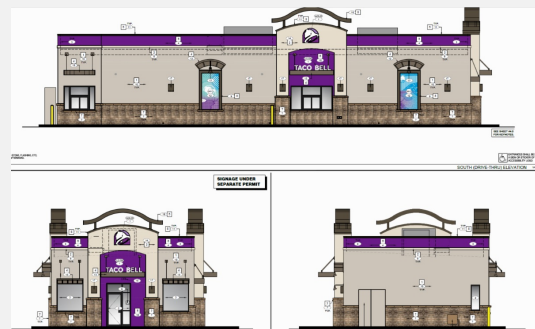
The voluntary merger was of two parcels, APNs 003-181-009 and 003-181-011, zoned R-1 and owned by the same property owner. APN 003-181-011 is currently less than the minimum lot size required for residential use. As a result, residential development on would not be permitted.

### 3. Design Review of Taco Bell Painting **(APPROVED)**

The Taco Bell project is to paint the building exterior. The palette consists mostly of earth-tone colors with a purple accent (which required approval).

## Planning Commission Vacancy Filled

## Public Works Division

### Red Curb Refresh

City staff recently completed repainting the majority of red curbs throughout Willows, focusing on areas where paint had faded over time. This work helps improve visibility, supports traffic safety, and ensures clear access for emergency vehicles. Freshly painted red curbs serve as an important reminder that these zones must remain clear at all times for public safety. Parking along red curb zones is strictly prohibited at all times.



### LED Solar Flashing Stop Signs - Tehama Street and Road 57

The City of Willows installed new solar-powered LED stop signs and poles at the intersection of Tehama Street and Road 57. The intersection was identified as a frequent collision incident location, and the new flashing stop signs are designed to increase visibility for approaching drivers during both the day and night. The LED lights help draw attention to the stop signs, particularly in low-light or foggy conditions, reducing the risk of collisions.



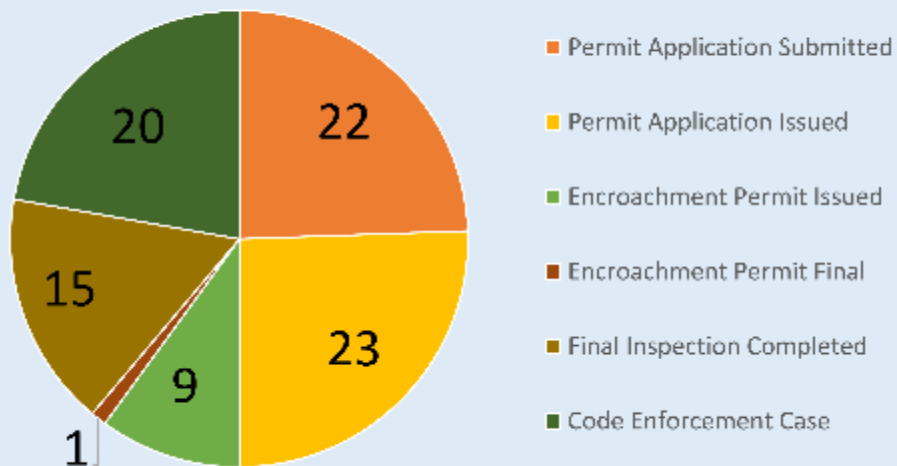


## Recreation Division

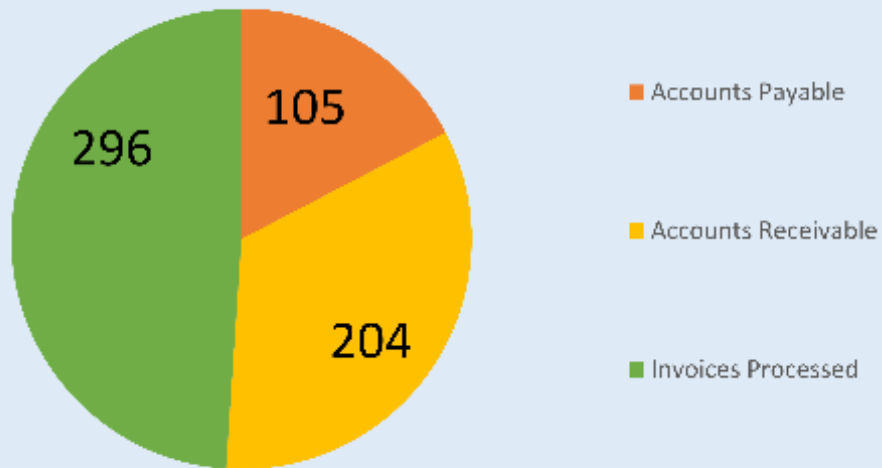

## Updates

### Glenn Medical Center Update

With Glenn Medical Center Emergency Departments Closure, the WFD team is starting to learn the new normal. For example, in the past two weeks, WFD has sent fire riders to Chico to assist with critically ill patients. In the past, this was a rare occurrence; however, from now on, more apparatus will need to respond to calls as the department adjusts its response plan to ensure that there is available equipment to respond when receiving concurrent calls.

### Glenn County EMS Study

In light of Glenn Medical Emergency's recent closure, Willows, Orland and Glenn County have partnered together to perform a joint EMS Study to evaluate the current state of the EMS system, assess its strengths and weaknesses, and offer potential solutions to ensure the countywide system is fiscally sustainable and feasible while offering efficient emergency response.

## Major Incidents

### Gas Leak

On September 29, 2025, at approximately 9:38 am, the Willows Fire Department (WFD) was notified of a gas leak caused by digging activity near South Yolo and East Oak Streets. Upon arrival, crews discovered a ¾-inch metal gas line had been ruptured and was actively leaking.



Yolo Incident Command (IC) was established, and a CODE RED alert was issued, advising residents to shelter in place within the area bounded by Colusa to Sacramento Streets, and Laurel to Walnut Streets. WFD personnel, assisted by the Glenn County Sheriff's Office (GCSO), visited door to door to ensure residents were properly notified.

The Willows Public Works Department responded to assist with road closures and barricades, while PG&E Gas crews conducted a "dig in" operation to isolate and repair the damaged line. The leak was successfully stopped at approximately 10:13 am. All shelter-in-place orders were lifted following repairs, and no injuries were reported as a result of the incident.

### **Commercial Vehicle Fire**

While on scene of a medical aid, WFD was dispatched to a commercial vehicle fire. Upon arrival, crews found a dump truck fully involved in flames. Fire personnel quickly contained the fire to the vehicle of origin, preventing further spread or damage. No injuries were reported, and the cause of the fire was not considered suspicious in nature.

### **Structure Fire**

WFD responded to a reported structure fire at County Roads 57 and M. Upon arrival, crews found electrical power lines arcing and in contact with the structure with light smoke visible from the building.

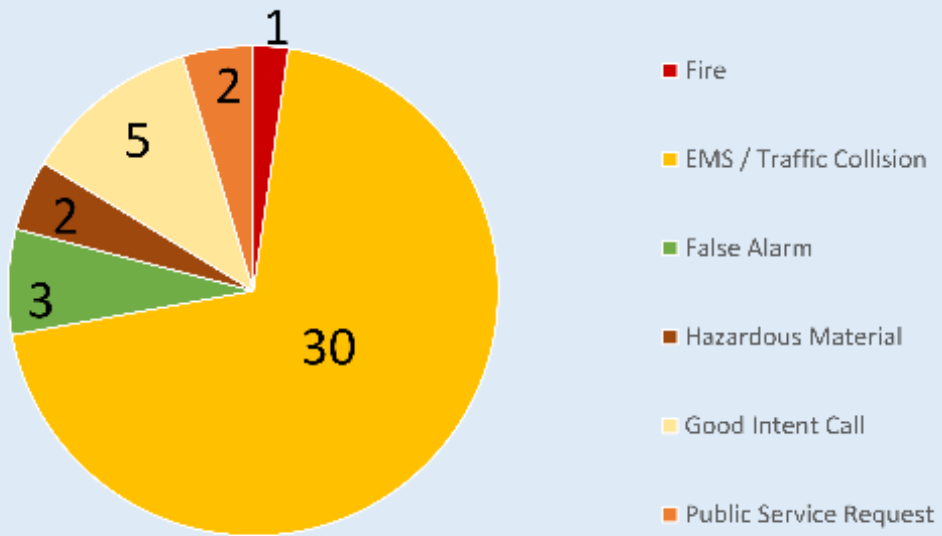
Fire personnel established a safety perimeter and isolated the affected area while awaiting the arrival of PG&E. Once the utility company de-energized the power lines, crews confirmed the fire was confined to the power box. The structure was thoroughly checked for fire extension, and all remaining hot spots were extinguished. The incident was contained to the power box with no further spread or damage reported.

### **Structure Fire - Automatic Aid**

WFD responded with one engine and one water tender to assist in the Orland area with a structure fire. Crews worked alongside local agencies to extinguish a large barn fire that had spread into nearby vegetation.

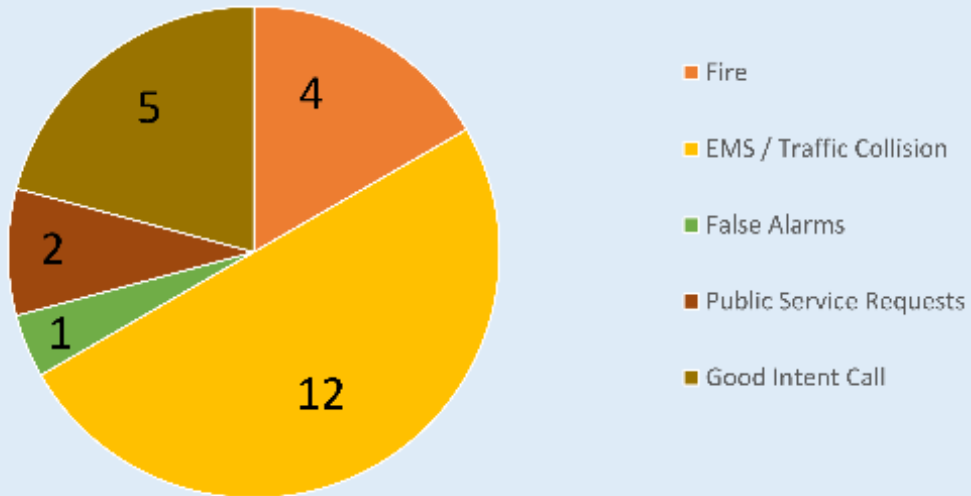

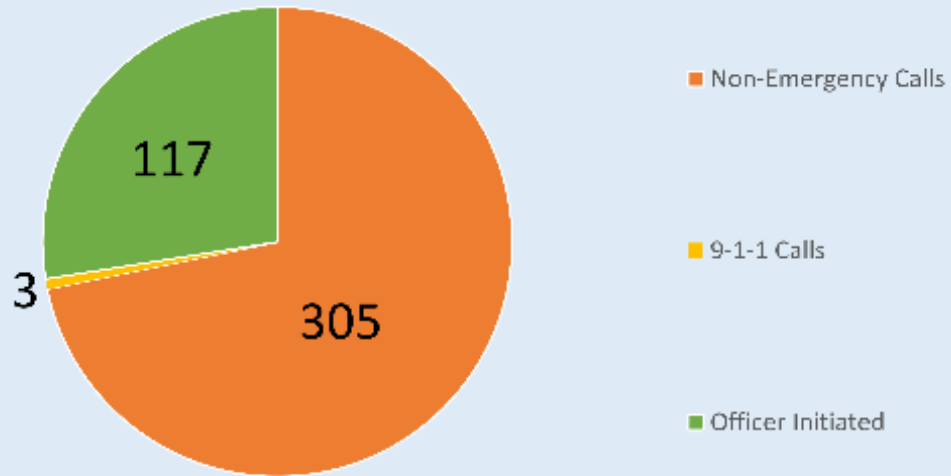

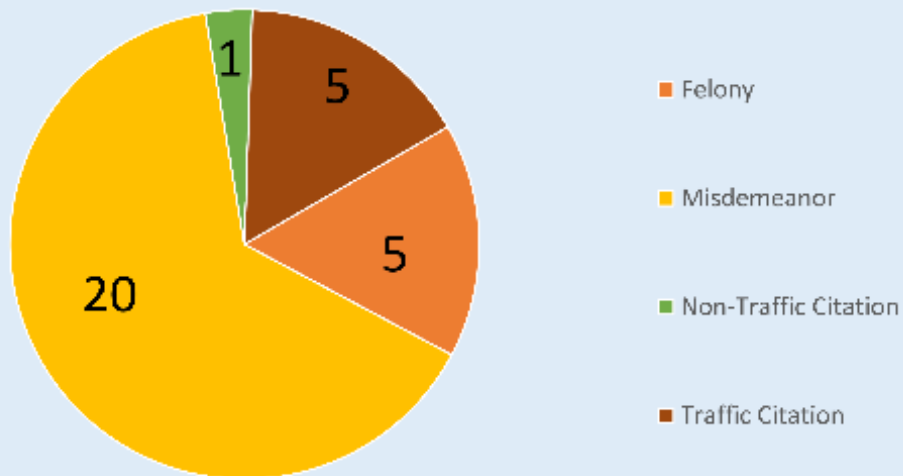
